

The wireless device (RM-383) described in this guide is approved for use on the following Verizon Wireless networks: CDMA 800 and 1900 MHz, CDMA2000 1xRTT, and EVDO. Contact Verizon Wireless for more information about networks.

Network Services

To use the device you must have service from a wireless service provider. Many of the features require special network features. These features are not available on all networks; other networks may require that you make specific arrangements with your service provider before you can use the network services. Using network services involves transmission of data. Check with your service provider for details about fees in your home network and when roaming in other networks. Your service provider can give you instructions and explain what charges will apply. Some networks may have limitations that affect how you can use network services. For instance, some networks may not support all language-dependent characters and services.

Your service provider may have requested that certain features be disabled or not activated in your device. If so, these features will not appear on your device menu. Your device may also have a special configuration such as changes in menu names, menu order, and icons. Contact your service provider for more information.

This device supports WAP 2.0 protocols (HTTP and SSL) that run on TCP/IP protocols. Some features of this device, such as sending e-mails, browsing websites, and downloading files require network support for these technologies.

This section describes how to start using your device after activating your services, how to contact customer support, and how to read this guide.

Install or Remove the Battery

Install the Battery

Note: Always switch off the power and disconnect the charger and any other device before removing the cover. Avoid touching electronic components while changing the cover. Always store and use the device with the cover attached.

 To remove the back cover, with the back of the device facing you, push down and slide the back cover toward the bottom of the device.



Insert the gold-colored contacts of the battery into the battery slot, and push down the other end of the battery to snap it into place.



To replace the back cover, align the cover tabs with the slots in the device, and slide the back cover toward the top of the device until the cover is securely in place.



Insert or Remove microSD Card

Remove the Battery

Always switch the device off and disconnect the charger before removing the battery.

- 1. Remove the back cover.
- Insert your finger into the finger grip, and lift the battery from its compartment.
- 3. Replace the back cover.



Insert or Remove microSD Card

Use only compatible microSD cards (sold separately) approved for use with this device. Nokia uses approved industry standards for memory cards, but some brands may not be fully compatible with this device. Incompatible cards may damage the card and the device and corrupt data stored on the card.

Insert the microSD Card

- Lift open the microSD slot cover.
- Insert the card firmly into the card slot with the gold-colored contacts facing up and towards the device. The card clicks into place.
- 3. Re-insert the microSD slot cover.



Remove the microSD Card

- 1. Lift open the microSD slot cover.
- Firmly press against the card until it releases from the card slot, and slide it out.

Important: Do not remove the memory card in the middle of an operation when the card is being accessed.

Removing the card in the middle of an operation may damage the memory card as well as the device, and data stored on the card may be corrupted.

Switch Your Device On or Off

To switch your device on or off, press and hold the End key () for at least 3 seconds.

Charge the Battery

- Plug the charger transformer into a standard wall outlet.
- Open the charging port on the left side of the device.



- Insert the charger output plug into the port. The battery strength indicator starts scrolling, showing the battery is charging.
- When the device is completely charged, unplug the charger from the device, then from the wall outlet to save energy.

Antenna

Your device may have internal and external antennas. As with any radio transmitting device, avoid touching the antenna area unnecessarily while the antenna is transmitting or receiving. Contact with such an antenna affects the communication quality and may cause the device to



operate at a higher power than otherwise needed and may reduce the battery life.

An internal GPS antenna is activated when you place an emergency call or select *Location On* from the *Location* menu. See "Location," p. 67.


Any GPS should not be used for precise location measurement, and you should never rely solely on location data from the GPS receiver and cellular radio networks for positioning or navigation.

Connect the Headset

To allow hands-free operation, you can connect a compatible headset with a standard 2.5-mm plug to your device.

Warning: When you use the headset, your ability to hear outside sounds may be affected. Do not use the headset where it can endanger your safety.

- Plug the headset connector into the 2.5-mm headset jack on the left side of the device.
- Place the headset in your ear. With the headset connected, you can make, answer, and end calls as usual.



Wrist Strap

The wrist strap does not come in the box.

- 1. Remove the back cover.
- 2. Thread the wrist strap, and tighten.
- 3. Replace the cover.



Flow to Read This Guide

The following sections illustrate various functions of your device. Familiarize yourself with these sections to understand the instructions that follow. This guide uses certain terms for the steps that you are asked to perform.

- · 'Press' means to press and release a key quickly.
- 'Press and hold' means to press and hold a key for 2–3 seconds before releasing it.
- · 'Scroll' means to highlight with the Directional key.
- 'Select' means to highlight with the Directional key and press the (OK) key.
- Generally, the step-by-step instructions start from the idle screen except when specifically indicated. To go back to the idle screen from your current working screen, press the End key ().
- To return to the previous screen, press the Clear key (CLR).
- In the idle screen, to select Message or Contacts, press the Left Soft key or the Right Soft key. To access the main menus, press the OK key (MENU), and scroll to the desired menu.
- When a menu is highlighted, to access a submenu, press the number of the submenu, or scroll to the desired item, and press the OK) key.

 To provide a visual representation of your current position in the menu structure, a scroll bar may be displayed on the right side of the screen.

Airplane Mode

Use Airplane Mode in radio sensitive environments - on board aircraft or in hospitals. When Airplane Mode is active, OFF is displayed.

- 1. Press the (OK) key (MENU), and scroll to Settings & Tools.
- 2. Press (7pgrs) Phone Settings, and then press (10 2) Airplane Mode.
- 3. Scroll to On or Off, and press the (OK) key.

Emergency Call in Airplane Mode

Enter the emergency number, and press the Call key (\bigcirc). Your device deactivates Airplane Mode and attempts to make an emergency call.

Find My Phone Number

To view the ten-digit number assigned to your device:

- 1. Press the (OK) key (MENU), and scroll to Settings & Tools.
- 2. Press (per Phone Info, and then press (per My Number.

This section describes how to make, answer and reject a call. It also describes how to use the speakerphone and view call logs.

Make a Call

Use the Keypad

Enter the phone number (including the area code if necessary), and press the Call key (\(\bigcup_{\cup} \)).

Use the Contact List

- Press the Right Soft key Contacts.
- Scroll to the desired contact, and press the (OK) key (VIEW) to display the details of the contact.

 If the entry contains more than one number, scroll to the desired number, and press the Call key () to call the number.

For information on adding contacts, see "Contacts," p. 36.

Use Speed Dial

To dial a single-digit speed dial number (1–9), press and hold the corresponding key. To dial a multi-digit speed dial number (10–999), press the keys for the first numbers, and press and hold the last number. For more information on, see "Speed Dials," p. 45.

You can also press the assigned speed dial location, and then press the Call key (\(\)).

Use Call Loa

- 1. Press the Call key ().
- Scroll to the desired number, and then press the Call key ().

Answer or Reject a Call

To answer a call, open the flip or, if it is already open, press the Call key (). To change settings for answering a call, see "Answer Options," p. 68.

To mute an incoming call, press the Left Soft key (Quiet).
To forward the call to your voicemail, press the Right Soft key (Ignore). To reject the call, press the End key (I).

Options During a Call

During a call, select Options and from the following:

Messaging — Send or retrieve messages.

Contact List — Search your Contact List.

Recent Calls - Check recent calls.

Bluetooth Menu — The following options are available if a Bluetooth headset is connected. Select Audio to Phone to hear the other party on the phone or Audio to Device to hear the other party on the Bluetooth headset.

Main Menu — Open the Main Menu.

Voice Privacy On — Protect the privacy of the conversation.

Notepad — Open the notepad.

Voice Record - Record the call.

Mute Function

During a call, to prevent the other party from hearing your voice, while allowing you to hear the other party, select *Mute*. To allow the other party to hear you again, select *Unmute*.

Speakerphone

To use the speakerphone, press the Speakerphone key ($\boxed{\bullet}$). To turn the speakerphone off, press the Speakerphone key ($\boxed{\bullet}$) again.

Warning:	Do not hold the device near your ear when the
	speakerphone is in use, because the volume may
	be extremely loud.

Recent Calls

Information on missed, received, or dialed calls is stored in the Recent Calls folder. When the number of calls exceeds the limit of call category folders, the oldest call is replaced.

View Call Log

- 1. Press the (OK) key (MENU), scroll to Recent Calls.
- Scroll to the call category folder (Missed, Received, Dialed, or All), and press the OK key to view the call log.
- In each call category folder, scroll to the desired call record, press the (OK) key (Open) to view details, or press the Left Soft key (Message) to create a new message, or press the Right Soft key (Options) and select from the available options to perform the corresponding operations.

Call Timers

Call timers record the time of incoming and outgoing calls as well as the volume of data transferred and received.

- 1. Press the (OK) key (MENU), scroll to Recent Calls.
- 2. Press (5 Jkl) View Timers.

- To return to the previous screen, press the (OK) key.
- To reset a timer, scroll to the desired timer, and press the Left Soft key (Reset).
- To reset all timers, press the Right Soft key (Reset All).

Note: The actual invoice for calls and services from your service provider may vary, depending on network features, rounding off for billing, taxes, and so forth.

Note: Some timers, including the life timer, may be reset during service or software upgrades.

This section describes how to select the desired entry modes and how to use predictive text entry mode.

Entry Modes

Your device offers five entry modes: Word, Abc, ABC, 123, and Symbols. The following rules apply:

- To delete a character, press the Clear key (CLR); to delete a word, press and hold the Clear key (CLR).
- To change character case in Word, Abc or ABC Mode, press (** * * * * *).
- To change the mode, press the Left Soft key.

Abc and ABC Modes

In Abc and ABC Modes, to enter a letter, repeatedly press a key until the desired letter appears. If you pause briefly, the last letter on the display is accepted, and your device awaits the next entry.

To activate Abc Mode or ABC Mode, press the Left Soft key, scroll to Abc or ABC, and press the OK) key.

Word Mode

Word Mode is a predictive text entry method that is based on a built-in dictionary to quickly recognize the most commonly used words for a specific key sequence.

- To activate Word Mode, press the Left Soft key, scroll to Word, and press the (OK) key.
- Enter your word with the keypad. In Word Mode, press a key once for each letter until the desired word appears.
 - If the displayed word is not correct, press (Onext) repeatedly to select from other options.
 - If the desired word is not found in the dictionary, delete your entry, press the Left Soft key to switch to Abc or ABC Mode and re-enter your word.
- When the correct word is displayed, press the Vibration key (α #) to confirm, and insert a space.

Number Entry

- To enter a number in Abc, ABC, or Word Mode, press and hold the desired number key.
- To switch to Number Mode, press the Left Soft key, scroll to 123, and press the (OK) key.

Symbol Entry

- To scroll through some common punctuation marks and special characters, press ([[o]]) repeatedly in Abc or ABC Mode.
- To insert special characters into your message, press the Left Soft key, scroll to Symbols, and press the (OK) key.

This section describes how to manage your contacts by storing their names, numbers, and other information. It also describes how to view contacts and configure the appearance in Habitat Mode

Hahitat Mode

Your device features a unique, contact-centric interface for visualizing your social circle in a natural habitat-inspired design setting.

This interface organizes call logs and messaging records per contact, and presents them in a chronological order, providing an engaging and intuitive way for you to track, visualize and connect with your social network.

Basic Control

- 1. To activate Habitat Mode, press the Directional key down.
- Press UP or DOWN on the Directional key to the desired contact, and press the (ok) key (VIEW) to view the history of calls and messages between you and the contact.
 - To call the contact, press the Call key (), or scroll to Call, and press the (oK) key.
 - To send a message to the contact, scroll to Message, and press the (OK) key.
 - To view the history between ALL, CALLS and MESSAGES, scroll left or right using the Directional key.

Settings

By default, the background colors will change on your device, depending on the time of day.

You can select a non-cycling color theme or adjust the number of visible contacts by following the steps below.

- 1. To activate Habitat Mode, press the Directional key down.
- Press the Right Soft key (Options). Scroll down to Settings, and press the (OK) key.
- 3. Scroll to Contacts Shown or Color.
- Scroll left or right to the desired number of contacts or color theme, and press the Right Soft key (Done).

Using Photos or Icons to Represent a Contact

If a contact has not been assigned a photo in the phone book, it is given one of 50 preloaded icons. The icon and the color shade are determined by the contact's phone number. You can replace the icon with a photo as follows:

- 1. To activate Habitat Mode, press the Directional key down.
- Scroll to the contact.
- Press the Right Soft key (Options). Edit contact is highlighted. Press the (OK) key.
- 4. Scroll to the *Picture*: field, and press the Left Soft key (Set).
- Scroll to the desired picture, and press the (OK) key, and then press the (OK) key (SAVE) to update the contact.

Hide a Contact

- 1. To activate Habitat Mode, press the Directional key down.
- Scroll to the contact you wish to hide, and press the Right Soft key (Options).
- 3. Scroll down to *Hide*, and press the (OK) key.

Unhide a Contact

- 1. To activate Habitat Mode, press the Directional key down.
- 2. Press the Right Soft key (Options).
- 3. Scroll down to Show Hidden, and press the (OK) key.

- Scroll to the desired contact, and press the Directional key right to Visible.
- 5. Press the (OK) key (SAVE).

Create New Contacts

Create a New Contact

- 1. Press the (OK) key (MENU). Contacts is highlighted.
- 2. To enter the contact information, press (102") New Contact.
- Scroll to the desired field, and enter the corresponding information.
 - To assign a picture ID to the contact, highlight the Picture: field, and press the Left Soft key (Set). To use an existing image as the picture ID for the contact, scroll to the desired image in the My Pictures folder, and press the
 OK) key.
 - To assign a ringtone to the contact, scroll to the Ringtone: field, and press the Left Soft key (Set). Scroll to the desired ringtone, and press the (OK) key.
 - To add a contact to a group, scroll to the *Group:* field, and press the Left Soft key (Set). Scroll to the desired group, and press the (ok) key.

- To assign a Speed Dial for a number, set a default number for a contact, or add pauses into a number, scroll to the desired number (Mobile 1, Mobile 2, Home, Work or Fax), press the Right Soft key (Options), and select from the available options.
- 4. Press the (OK) key (SAVE).

Update a Number to a Contact

You can add new numbers to contacts by entering the number in the idle screen

- Enter the number, press the Left Soft key (Save), and select Add New Contact or Update Existing by pressing the (OK) key.
- Complete the contact information or update an existing contact, and press the OK key.

Add Pauses

Calls to automated systems often require a password or account number. Instead of manually entering numbers each time, store the numbers to your contacts along with special characters called pauses.

You may add pauses after entering a number in the idle screen.

1. Enter the phone number.

- To add pauses, press the Right Soft key (Options), and press ([@z]) 2-Sec Pause or (Zabc) Wait, then enter additional digits.
- Press the Left Soft key (Save), and select Add New Contact or Update Existing by pressing the (OK) key.
- 4. Complete the contact information or update the number to an existing contact, and press the (OK) key.

Contact List

In the idle screen, to quickly access the contact list, press the Right Soft key (Contacts).

Find a Contact Entry

- 1. Press the (OK) key (MENU). Contacts is highlighted.
- 2. Press (2 abc) Contact List.
- In the Go To field, enter the first letters of the name you wish to find, and select from the proposed matches, or scroll using the Directional key.

View a Contact Entry

- 1. Press the (OK) key (MENU). Contacts is highlighted.
- 2. Press (2 abc) Contact List.
- Scroll to the desired contact, and then press the (OK) key (VIEW). The contact information is displayed. Select from the available options.

Edit a Contact Entry

- 1. Press the (OK) key (MENU). Contacts is highlighted.
- 2. Press (2 abc) Contact List.
- Scroll to the desired contact, and then press the Left Soft key (Edit). For editing options, see "Create a New Contact," p. 39.
- 4. To save the update, press the (OK) key (SAVE).

Contact List Options

- 1. Press the (OK) key (MENU). Contacts is highlighted.
- 2. Press (2 abc) Contact List.
- Scroll to the desired contact, press the Right Soft key (Options), and select from the following:

New Contact — Create a new Contact List entry.

Erase — Delete the contact entry.

New TXT Message — Send the contact a text message (network service).

New Picture Message — Send the contact a picture message (network service).

New Video Message — Send the contact a video message (network service).

Set As ICE Contact or Unassign ICE Contact — Set your contact as an ICE (In Case of Emergency) contact or unassign your contact as an ICE contact.

Call – Call the contact (network service).

Send Name Card — Send the contact information in vCard format to another device using Bluetooth connectivity.

Erase All — Delete all contacts.

Contact Groups

Contact groups help organize contact entries into categories, and allow you to search your contacts faster and send a message to all contacts in one or more groups.

Create a New Group

- 1. Press the (OK) key (MENU). Contacts is highlighted.
- 2. Press (def ∃) Groups.
- To add a new group, press the Left Soft key (New), enter a name, and press the (OK) key (SAVE).

Rename a Group

- 1. Press the (OK) key (MENU). Contacts is highlighted.
- Press (def ∃) Groups.
- Scroll to the desired group, press the Right Soft key (Options), and then press (4 gni) Rename.
- 4. Enter a new name, and press the (OK) key (SAVE).

Move a Contact Entry to a Group

1. Press the (OK) key (MENU). Contacts is highlighted.

- 2. Press (def 3) Groups.
- Scroll to the desired group, and press the (OK) key (VIEW), and then press the (OK) key (ADD).
- Scroll to the desired contact, and then press the (OK) key (MARK).
- Repeat the previous step until all the desired contacts are marked, and then press the Left Soft key (Done).

A contact can only be associated with one group at a time.

Erase a Group

- 1. Press the (OK) key (MENU). Contacts is highlighted.
- 2. Press (def ∃) Groups.
- Scroll to the desired group, press the Right Soft key (Options), and then press (S sk) Erase.
- To erase the group, highlight Yes, and then press the (OK) key.

Send a Group Message (Network Service)

- 1. Press the (OK) key (MENU). Contacts is highlighted.
- 2. Press (def ∃) Groups.
- 3. Scroll to the desired group, and press the Right Soft key (Options), then ([ext]) New TXT Message, ([abc]) New Picture Message, or ([add 3]) New Video Message.
- 4. Create a message, and press the (OK) key (SEND).

Speed Dials

You can associate any mobile, home, or work phone number in the contact list with a speed dial location from 2 to 999 (network service).

Voicemail is assigned to speed dial location 1. Speed dial location 95 (#Warranty Center) is used to contact Verizon Warranty Center. Speed dial location 97 (#BAL) is used to check your billing balance. Speed dial location 98 (#MIN) is used to check your Verizon Wireless usage. Speed dial location 99 (#PMT) is used to make a bill payment.

To use speed dials, you must first ensure the one touch dial feature is enabled. See "One Touch Dial," p. 70.

Assign a Speed Dial Location

- 1. Press the (OK) key (MENU). Contacts is highlighted.

- To overwrite the existing speed dial location, highlight Yes, press the (OK) key, scroll to a desired contact, and then press the (OK) key.
- To select a number for speed dial for a contact with more than one number, scroll to the desired number, and press the (ok) key.

Remove a Speed Dial Location

- 1. Press the (OK) key (MENU). Contacts is highlighted.
- 2. Press (4 ghi) Speed Dials.
- Scroll to an assigned speed dial location, and press the Right Soft key (Remove).
- 4. Highlight Yes, press the (OK) key.

Emergency Contacts

In Case of Emergency (ICE) allows you to store names, phone numbers and other information, which will be helpful in case of emergency.

Tip: When you have assigned ICE contacts and your device is locked, press the Left Soft key (ICE) to view the emergency information without unlocking the device.

This section describes how to send different types of messages. It also describes other messaging features.

Text Messages

If you have subscribed to a message network service, you can send and receive messages between compatible devices that also subscribe to a message service.

Picture or Video Message

Your device supports the sending of text messages beyond the character limit for a single message. Longer messages are sent as a series of two or more messages. Verizon Wireless may charge accordingly. Characters that use accents or other marks, and characters from some language options, take up more space, limiting the number of characters that can be sent in a single message.

Write and Send a Text Message

- 1. Press the (OK) key (MENU), and scroll to Messaging.
- To write a new text message, press ([[@2"]]) New Message, and then press ([[@2"]]) TXT Message.
- 3. Select a recipient from the contact list or enter the number.
- To move to the Text: field, press the (OK) key. Compose a message using the Alphanumeric keypad.
- 5. To send the message, press the (OK) key (SEND).

Picture or Video Message

The wireless network may limit the size of picture and video messages. If the inserted picture exceeds this limit, the device may make it smaller so that it can be sent.

A picture or video message can contain text and objects such as pictures, sound clips, or video clips.

To check availability and to subscribe to the picture or video messaging service, contact Verizon Wireless.

Important: Exercise caution when opening messages.

Messages may contain malicious software or otherwise be harmful to your device.

Write and Send a Picture or Video Message

- 1. Press the (OK) key (MENU), and scroll to Messaging.
- To write a new text message, press ([ex]) New Message, then press ([2 abc]) Picture Message or ([per 3]) Video Message.
- 3. Select a recipient from the contact list or enter the number.
- To move to the Text: field, press the OK key. Compose a message using the Alphanumeric keypad.
- 5. Add multimedia contents.
 - Picture message
 - To add a picture, scroll down to the *Picture*: field.
 Press the Left Soft key (My Pics), scroll to the desired picture, and press the (OK) key. To add a new picture using the camera, press the Right Soft key (Options), press ([OK]) Take Picture, press the (OK) key (TAKE), and press the Left Soft key (Save).

2. To add a sound clip, scroll down to the *Sound*: field. Press the Left Soft key (Sounds), scroll to the desired sound clip, and press the (OK) key. To record a new sound clip, press ([0x]) Record New, press the (OK) key to begin recording, and then press the (OK) key (STOP) to end recording, and press the (OK) key to select the new recording and return to the message.

Video message

To add a video clip to a video message, scroll down to the *Video*: field. Press the Left Soft key (Videos), scroll to the desired video clip, and press the (OK) key. To add a new video clip using the camcorder, press the Right Soft key (Options), press ([ox]) Record Video, press the (OK) key (REC) to begin recording, press the (OK) key (STOP) to end recording, and then press the Left Soft key (Save).

- To add a message title, scroll down to the Subject:. Enter text (up to 80 characters) using the Alphanumeric keypad.
- 7. To send the message, press the (OK) key (SEND).

Message Folders

The device saves received messages in the Inbox folder. The Sent folder is used to store messages that have been delivered to their recipients. The Drafts folder is used to store drafts of messages.

To open the Inbox, Sent, or Drafts folder, press the Left Soft key (Message), and then press ((abc) Inbox, ((def 3) Sent, or ((4 ghl) Drafts. The message list is displayed. Scroll to a message, and select from the available options.

Voicemail

Receive a Voicemail Message

When you receive a new voicemail message, the device displays a voicemail notification.

- 1. Scroll to Listen Now or Listen Later.
- 2. Press the (OK) key.

Listen to a Voicemail Message

- Press the Left Soft key (Message), and then press (5 Jkl) Voicemail.
- Press the (OK) key (CALL) to dial your voicemail service and retrieve your message.

Visual Voice Mail

Your device features a visual interface to access and manage your voicemail messages. With this, you do not need to listen through voice instructions, but can directly use onscreen options to listen to messages and archive them, call back or reply with text messages, and more.

1. Press the (OK) key (MENU), and scroll to Messaging.

 Press (mno 6) Visual Voice Mail, and then select from the available options.

Mobile Instant Messaging

- 1. Press the (OK) key (MENU), and scroll to Messaging.
- Press (pers) Mobile IM, and then select from the available options to download IM applications, or use one of the applications preloaded.

Email Message

- 1. Press the (OK) key (MENU), and scroll to Messaging.
- To launch the internet browser and access the email messaging screen (network service), press ([8 tw]) Email.

Important: Exercise caution when opening messages.

Messages may contain malicious software or otherwise be harmful to your phone.

Chat

- 1. Press the (OK) key (MENU), and scroll to Messaging.
- To launch a browser and chat with IM users (network service), press (wyz 9) Chat.

Bloas

- 1. Press the (OK) key (MENU), and scroll to *Messaging*.
- 2. To access your personal blogs, press (Onext) Blogs.

Message Settings

This menu allows you to define settings for messages sent or received on your device.

- Press the Left Soft key (Message), and then press the Left Soft key (Settings).
- 2. To define message settings, select from the following:

Entry Mode — Change the default entry mode for writing text.

Auto Save Sent — Select whether to automatically save all sent messages to the Sent folder.

Auto Erase Inbox — Select whether to automatically erase the oldest (unlocked) message from the Inbox folder when the device memory is full. If set to *Off*, you are prompted to delete messages from your Inbox when the memory is full.

Messaging Font Size — Change the character size of messages in folders and when composing a text message.

TXT Auto View — Select whether to display incoming text messages automatically. If set to Off, when a message is received, you are prompted to select View Now or View Later.

Pic-Video Auto Receive — Select whether to save incoming picture or video messages automatically. If set to *Off*, you can select *Reject* to refuse to receive the message.

Message Settings

Quick Text — View and edit Quick Text entries that are short, prewritten messages that you can insert into text messages.

Voicemail # — Change the default voicemail speed dial number.

Callback # — Change the default callback number that is sent.

Signature — Create or edit text that is automatically attached to each outgoing message.

My Verizon

My Verizon connects to the Verizon Wireless Mobile Web, which allows you to browse the web from your device. For more information, see "Mobile Web," p. 77.

Bluetooth Wireless Technology

Bluetooth technology enables wireless connections between electronic devices and can be used to send and receive images,

Bluetooth Wireless Technology

texts, voice recordings, video clips, notes, and more. It can also be used to connect wirelessly to products that use Bluetooth wireless technology, such as computers. You can synchronize your phone and your PC using Bluetooth connectivity.

This device is compliant with Bluetooth specification 2.0, supporting the following profiles: HSP (headset profile), HFP (hands-free car kit profile), DUN (dial-up networking), A2DP (stereo), PBAP (phonebook access), BIP/BPP (printing and imaging), OPP (object push — support for vCard and vCalendar), FTP (file transfer). To ensure interoperability between other devices supporting Bluetooth technology, use approved accessories for this model. Check with the manufacturers of other devices on compatibility with this device.

Pair

To send or receive information via Bluetooth connectivity, you must pair a recognized Bluetooth wireless device.

- 1. Press the (OK) key MENU, and scroll to Settings & Tools.
- 2. Press ([aef 3]) Bluetooth Menu. A message will appear asking if you would like help setting up Bluetooth. Press the ([OK]) key (Yes). A message will appear asking you to turn on the wireless device you want to pair to. Press the ([OK]) key. The program will automatically turn on Bluetooth technology and search for Bluetooth devices nearby and then display a list of available devices.

- To pair a Bluetooth headset, scroll to the headset you want to pair with, and press the (ox) key (PAIR).
- The device may request you to use the alphanumeric keypad to enter the passkey of the headset you want to pair with. You should be able to find this in the headset's user guide.
- Press the OK key. Your phone will then pair with the headset.
- Choose Always Ask or Always Connect and press the (OK) key. Select Yes or No and press the (OK) key.

Turn Bluetooth On or Off

To use Bluetooth features, you must turn the Bluetooth connectivity on.

Bluetooth Wizard will pop up the first time you go into the Bluetooth Menu.

Note: Features using Bluetooth technology increase the demand on battery power and reduce the battery life.

- 1. Press the (OK) key (MENU), and scroll to Settings & Tools.
- 2. Press (def 3) Bluetooth Menu.
- Press the Left Soft key to turn Bluetooth connectivity on or off.

Bluetooth Wireless Technology

Bluetooth Settings

- 2. Press ([set 3]) Bluetooth Menu. A message will appear asking if you would like help setting up Bluetooth. Press the (OK) key (Yes). A message will appear asking you to turn on the wireless device. Press the (OK) key. The program will automatically turn on Bluetooth technology and search for Bluetooth devices nearby and then display a list of available devices.
- To configure the Bluetooth settings, press the Right Soft key (Options) and select from the following:
 - Bluetooth Wizard: To search for devices, pair and connect to a device.
 - My Phone Name: To enter a customized name for device recognition.
 - Discovery Mode: To allow other devices to see your device.
 - Sharing: To allow you to enable sharing the My Pictures, My Videos, and Bluetooth Inbox folders.
 - Supported Profiles: To display a list of supported Bluetooth profiles. Highlight a profile and press the (OK) key (VIEW) to see the details.
 - · My Name Card: To display My Name Card details.
 - Bluetooth Inbox: To view files received via Bluetooth.

Sounds Settings

- 1. Press the (OK) key (MENU), and scroll to Settings & Tools.
- Press ((() Sound Settings., and select from the following: Call Sounds Set ringtones for incoming calls by selecting Call Ringtone, and then the desired ringtone. Set the device to vibrate when a call is received by setting Call Vibrate on.

Alert Sounds — Select the alert type (Tone, Vibrate, or Reminder) for an incoming text message, picture message, or voicemail. Select Emergency Tone to set the alert type (Alert, Vibrate, or Off) for emergency dialing.

Keypad Volume — Set the volume for the keypad.

Service Alerts — Activate an alert.

- Select ERI (Enhanced Roaming Indicator) to display the status of the mobile service (network service). The status can be "Verizon Network", "Extended Network", or "Roaming". See "Banner," p. 61.
- Select Minute Beep to sound an alert every minute during a call.
- Select Call Connect to alert you when a call is connected.
 Power On/Off Enable or disable tones when your device is turned on or off. This option only works when the master volume is not set to All Sounds Off or Alarm Only.

Turn Silent Mode On or Off

Personal Banner — Enter your own banner text of up to 18 characters. To change the text color, select Color. The Color option is only available when Habitat Mode is disabled. See "Habitat," p. 64.

ERI Banner — Display ERI text over your personal banner, alerting you to the current cellular status (network service).

Backlight

- Press the (OK) key (MENU), and scroll to Settings & Tools.
- 2. Press ([5] M) Display Settings, press ([2 abc]) Backlight, and then select from the following:

Front Display, Main Display, Keypad — Set how long the front display, main display, or the keypad backlight remains on before dimming.

Wallpaper

- Press the (OK) key (MENU), and scroll to Settings & Tools.
- Press (sight) Display Settings, and then press (def 3) Wallpaper.
- Press ([a*]) My Pictures or ([2*]) My Videos, select an image or a video, and then press the (ok) key. The wallpaper will only be displayed if Habitat Mode is disabled, see "Habitat," p. 64. If Habitat Mode is activated, a prompt is displayed asking whether you want to turn it off.

Display Themes

- 1. Press the (OK) key (MENU), and scroll to Settings & Tools.
- 2. Press ([5]k) Display Settings, and then press ([4 9hi) Display Themes.
- 3. Scroll to the desired option, and press the (OK) key SET.

To set the theme, Habitat Mode (the default) must be disabled. See "Habitat," p. 64.

Main Menu Settings

- 1. Press the (OK) key (MENU), and scroll to Settings & Tools.
- 2. Press ([5_]ki]) *Display Settings*, and then press ([5_]ki]) *Main Menu Settings*.
- 3. Scroll to the desired option, and press the (OK) key. The default Main Menu setting is *Tab*.

Phone Settings

When Airplane Mode is on, all features that use radio frequencies are disabled and you cannot place or receive phone calls. See "Airplane Mode," p. 27.

Set Shortcuts

You can assign applications to the UP, LEFT or DOWN Directional keys. These can be opened by pressing the corresponding keys on the idle screen. The RIGHT Directional key is used to access My Shortcuts. The default shortcuts are listed as follow:

- 2. Press (B tw) Call Settings, and then press (2 abc) Auto Retry.
- To automatically redial a number when the attempted call fails, scroll to On, and then press the (OK) key.

TTY Mode

- Press ((aur)) Call Settings, and then press ((aur 3) TTY Mode.
 A prompt informs you that enabling TTY will disable headset audio. Press the (ok) key, and then select from the following:

TTY Full — Turn on full TTY capability.

TTY + Talk — Turn on TTY in voice carry-over (VCO) mode.

TTY + Hear — Turn on TTY in hearing carry-over (HCO) mode.

TTY Off — Turn off TTY mode.

HAC Mode

- 1. Press the (OK) key (MENU), and scroll to Settings & Tools.
- 2. Press (B tuv) Call Settings, and then press (4 ghi) HAC Mode.
- To turn on hearing aid compatibility (HAC) mode, scroll to On, and then press the (OK) key.

One Touch Dial

You can use the one touch dial feature by pressing and holding the designated speed dial key. See "Speed Dials," p. 45.

Save Options — To set your Pictures, Videos, and Sounds to be saved to either phone memory or card memory.

Phone Memory — To view the memory usage for everything stored on your phone.

Card Memory — To view memory usage of everything stored on your memory card.

Phone Info

- 1. Press the (OK) key (MENU), and scroll to Settings & Tools.
- 2. Press (Onext) *Phone Info*, and then select from the following:

My number — To display the Mobile Device and Identification numbers.

SW/HW Version — To view the version of software, PRL, ERI, Browser, Media Center, MSUI, Hardware, and ESN of your device.

Icon Glossary — To view the list of icons with a brief description.

Software Update — To check the software update status and the availability of new software.

 Highlight the desired item and Press the (OK) key to view the detailed information.

- The CONFIRM PURCHASE screen displays the price and items you selected to purchase. Press the (OK) key (Buy) to accept the terms.
- You receive confirmation that your purchase was successful and your music is available for download. Press the OK) key to download the song. You can then play your new song from the My Music menu.

Sync Your Music from Your PC to Your V CAST Music Wireless Device

- Open V CAST Music with Rhapsody. Don't have V CAST MUSIC with Rhapsody? Download it for free at www.verizonwireless.com/music.
- Plug in the USB cable (purchased separately) to your phone and connect it to a USB port on your PC.
- From the main screen on your phone, the SYNC MUSIC V CAST MOBILE PHONE display appears. Your phone should display the message: Connected.
- Drag and drop the song(s) you want to sync from My Library, to your V CAST mobile phone, listed under the Sources tab.

This section describes how to perform some simple voice commands, calculations, and set an alarm.

Voice Commands

Call contacts and carry out device functions by giving a voice command.

Voice commands are language-dependent, and you must set the recognition language. Before using voice commands, see "Language," p. 67.

In the idle screen, to quickly access the voice commands, press and hold $(\bigcap_{n=1}^{\infty})$ until the voice commands list displays.

Voice Commands Settings

- 1. Press the (OK) key (MENU), and scroll to Settings & Tools.
- Press (∑abc) Tools, and then press (∑abc) Voice Commands.
- Press the Right Soft key (Settings), and select from the available options.

Voice Commands

Some functions that you can perform using voice commands on your device are:

- Call <Name> <Loc>: To dial by saying a name in your contact list, a name and a location (home, work, mobile) or the phone number.
- Send < Msg Type>: To send a text, picture, or video message to a number or to someone in your Contact List.
- Lookup < Name >: To open the contact record for any name in your contact list.
- Play < Playlist>: To open a music playlist.
- Go To <Menu>: To open any application installed on your device.
- Check < Item>: To view details of your phone status, voicemail, messages, missed calls, time, signal strength, battery level, and volume level.

- My Verizon: To view information about your Verizon Wireless account.
- Help: To read a tutorial on how to use Voice Commands.

Calculator

Calculator allows you to perform simple mathematical calculations using your device.

- 1. Press the (OK) key (MENU), and scroll to Settings & Tools.
- 2. Press (2 abc) Tools, and then press (2 abc) Calculator.
- Enter the first number of the calculation using the Alphanumeric keypad.
 - To change a number to a negative, press (, #).
 - To insert a decimal point, press (★☆+).
- Use the Directional key to add (UP), subtract (DOWN), multiply (RIGHT), or divide (LEFT) values. To enter a parenthesis or power, press the Right Soft key (Operator) and select (,), or Power by pressing the (OK) key.
- 5. Enter the second number.
- 6. Press the (OK) key (equals) to solve your equation.

Note: This calculator has limited accuracy and is designed for simple calculations.

Calendar

The calendar allows you to document your schedule and keep it convenient to access. You can schedule appointments in the calendar and set your device to alert you with a reminder.

Schedule a New Appointment

- 1. Press the (OK) key (MENU), and scroll to Settings & Tools.
- 2. Press (2 abc) Tools, and then press (def 3) Calendar.
- To add a new appointment, scroll to the desired date, and then press the Left Soft key (Add).
- Enter the details and use the Directional key to navigate between information fields
- 5. Press the (OK) key (SAVE).

Update an Existing Appointment

- 1. Press the (OK) key (MENU), and scroll to Settings & Tools.
- 2. Press (2 abc) Tools, and then press (def 3) Calendar.
- Scroll to the date of the appointment to be modified, and then press the (OK) key (VIEW).
- Scroll to the desired appointment entry, press the (OK) key (VIEW), and then press the (OK) key (EDIT).
- Scroll to the fields to be updated, edit the corresponding information, and then press the (oK) key (SAVE).

Calendar Preview

Calendar preview allows you to display the calendar appointments for the current date in the idle screen.

- 1. Press the (OK) key (MENU), and scroll to Settings & Tools.
- 2. Press (2 abd) Tools, and then press (4 ghi) Calendar Preview.
- Press ([[@]]) Main Screen, scroll to On, and then press the (OK) key. The calendar preview will only be displayed if Habitat Mode (the default) is turned off, see "Habitat," p. 64. If Habitat Mode is turned on, a prompt is displayed asking whether you want to turn it off.

Alarm Clock

Set an Alarm

- 1. Press the (OK) key (MENU), and scroll to Settings & Tools.
- 2. Press (2 abc) Tools, and then press (5 Jkl) Alarm Clock.
- Three options display as Alarm 1, Alarm 2, and Alarm 3.
 Scroll to the desired option, and press the (OK) key.
- To complete the alarm settings, enter details and navigate between information fields.
- Press the (OK) key (SAVE). When an alarm is set, is displayed on the idle screen.

When an alarm time is reached, the alarm tone sounds or your device vibrates, depending on the master volume settings.

Select *Snooze* to turn the alarm off and have it sound again after 10 minutes. Select *Dismiss* to turn off the alarm.

Stopwatch

The stopwatch can be used for time measurement, such as for a sporting event. You can time up to ten records.

The accuracy of the stopwatch is not the same as that of a professional instrument. Therefore, Nokia advises against its use for official competitions or any other event in which a high-precision device would be required to establish exact times.

- 1. Press the (OK) key (MENU), and scroll to Settings & Tools.
- 2. Press (2 abc) Tools, and then press (mno 6) Stopwatch.
 - To start timing an event, press the (OK) key (START).
 The elapsed time is displayed in the mm:ss:ms format.
 - To time multiple events and mark the elapsed time for each event you are timing, press the Left Soft key (Split).
 - To stop the watch, press the (OK) key (STOP).
 - To reset the watch to zero after stopping it, press the Right Soft key (Reset).

World Clock

World clock allows you to determine the current time in another time zone or country.

- 1. Press the (OK) key (MENU), and scroll to Settings & Tools.
- Press (Z abc) Tools, and then press (T pors) World Clock.
 The world map is displayed. When scrolling over the world map, the corresponding local time is displayed below the city name.
 - To turn daylight savings time on or off for the selected city, press the Left Soft key (Set DST).
 - To view a list of cities, press the Right Soft key (Cities).

Notepad

Notepad allows you to add, read, edit, or erase notes.

- 1. Press the (OK) key (MENU), and scroll to Settings & Tools.
- 2. Press (2 abc) Tools, and then press (8 tuv) Notepad.
 - To create a note, press the Left Soft key (New) or (Add).
 - To view or edit a note, scroll to the desired note, and press the (OK) key (VIEW), then press the (OK) key (EDIT).
 - To delete one or all notes, press the Right Soft key (Options), scroll to Erase or Erase All, and then press the (OK) key.

Charging and Discharging

Your device is powered by a rechargeable battery. The battery intended for use with this device is BL-4C. Nokia may make additional battery models available for this device. This device is intended for use when supplied with power from the following chargers: AC-6U. The exact charger model number may vary depending on the type of plug. The plug variant is identified by one of the following: E, EB, X, AR, U, A,C or UB.

The battery can be charged and discharged hundreds of times, but it will eventually wear out. When the talk and standby times are noticeably shorter than normal, replace the battery. Use only Nokia approved batteries, and recharge your battery only with Nokia approved chargers designated for this device. Use only replacement batteries qualified with the device per the IEEE 1725–2006 standard. Use of an unapproved battery or charger may present a risk of fire, explosion, leakage, or other hazard.

If a battery is being used for the first time or if the battery has not been used for a prolonged period, it may be necessary to connect the charger, then disconnect and reconnect it to begin charging the battery. If the battery is completely discharged, it may take several minutes before the charging indicator appears on the display or before any calls can be made.

Always switch the device off and disconnect the charger before removing the battery.

Unplug the charger from the electrical plug and the device when not in use. Do not leave a fully charged battery connected to a charger, since overcharging may shorten its lifetime. If left unused, a fully charged battery will lose its charge over time.

Always try to keep the battery between 15°C and 25°C (59°F and 77°F). Extreme temperatures reduce the capacity and lifetime of the battery. A device with a hot or cold battery may not work temporarily. Battery performance is particularly limited in temperatures well below freezing.

Do not short-circuit the battery. Accidental short-circuiting can occur when a metallic object such as a coin, clip, or pen causes direct connection of the positive (+) and negative (-) terminals of the battery. (These look like metal strips on the battery.) This might happen, for example, when you carry a spare battery in your pocket or purse. Short-circuiting the terminals may damage the battery or the connecting object.

Nokia Battery Authentication Guidelines

Do not dispose of batteries in a fire as they may explode. Batteries may also explode if damaged. Dispose of batteries according to local regulations. Please recycle when possible. Do not dispose as household waste.

Do not dismantle, cut, open, crush, bend, deform, puncture, or shred cells or batteries. In the event of a battery leak, do not allow the liquid to come in contact with the skin or eyes. In the event of such a leak, flush your skin or eyes immediately with water, or seek medical help.

Do not modify, remanufacture, attempt to insert foreign objects into the battery, or immerse or expose it to water or other liquids.

Improper battery use may result in a fire, explosion, or other hazard. If the device or battery is dropped, especially on a hard surface, and you believe the battery has been damaged, take it to a service center for inspection before continuing to use it.

Use the battery only for its intended purpose. Never use any charger or battery that is damaged. Keep your battery out of the reach of small children.

Nokia Battery Authentication Guidelines

Always use original Nokia batteries for your safety. To check that you are getting an original Nokia battery, purchase it from a Nokia authorized service center or dealer, and inspect the hologram label using the following steps:

Authenticate hologram

- When you look at the hologram on the label, you should see the Nokia connecting hands symbol from one angle and the Nokia Original Enhancements logo when looking from another angle.
- When you angle the hologram left, right, down and up, you should see 1,2,3 and 4 dots on each side respectively.





Successful completion of the steps is not a total assurance of the authenticity of the battery. If you have any reason to believe that your battery is not an authentic, original Nokia battery, you should refrain from using it, and take it to the nearest Nokia authorized service center or dealer for assistance. What if your battery is not authentic?

If you cannot confirm that your Nokia battery with the hologram on the label is an authentic Nokia battery, please do not use the battery. Take it to the nearest authorized Nokia service center or dealer for assistance. The use of a battery that is not approved by Nokia may be dangerous and may result in poor performance and damage to your device and its accessories. It may also invalidate any approval or warranty applying to the device.

For additional information, refer to the warranty and reference leaflet included with your Nokia device.

Care and Maintenance

Your device is a product of superior design and craftsmanship and should be treated with care. The following suggestions will help you protect your warranty coverage.

- Keep the device dry. Precipitation, humidity, and all types of liquids or moisture can contain minerals that will corrode electronic circuits. If your device does get wet, remove the battery, and allow the device to dry completely before replacing it.
- Do not use or store the device in dusty, dirty areas. Its moving parts and electronic components can be damaged.
- Do not store the device in hot areas. High temperatures can shorten the life of electronic devices, damage batteries, and warp or melt certain plastics.
- Do not store the device in cold areas. When the device returns to its normal temperature, moisture can form inside the device and damage electronic circuit boards.
- Do not attempt to open the device other than as instructed in this guide.
- Do not drop, knock, or shake the device. Rough handling can break internal circuit boards and fine mechanics.
- Do not use harsh chemicals, cleaning solvents, or strong detergents to clean the device.

Care and Maintenance

- Do not paint the device. Paint can clog the moving parts and prevent proper operation.
- Use a soft, clean, dry cloth to clean any lenses, such as camera, proximity sensor, and light sensor lenses.
- Use only the supplied or an approved replacement antenna.
 Unauthorized antennas, modifications, or attachments could damage the device and may violate regulations qoverning radio devices.
- Use chargers indoors.
- Always create a backup of data you want to keep, such as contacts and calendar notes.
- To reset the device from time to time for optimum performance, power off the device and remove the battery.

These suggestions apply equally to your device, battery, charger, or any enhancement. If any device is not working properly, take it to the nearest authorized service facility for service.

Additional Safety Information

Small children

Your device and its accessories may contain small parts. Keep them out of the reach of small children.

Operating environment

This device meets RF exposure guidelines when used either in the normal use position against the ear or when positioned at least 2.2 centimeters (7/8 inches) away from the body. When a carry case, belt clip, or holder is used for body-worn operation, it should not contain metal and should position the device the above-stated distance from your body. To transmit data files or messages, this device requires a quality connection to the network. In some cases, transmission of data files or messages may be delayed until such a connection is available. Ensure the above separation distance instructions are followed until the transmission is completed.

Parts of the device are magnetic. Metallic materials may be attracted to the device. Do not place credit cards or other magnetic storage media near the device, because information stored on them may be erased.

Medical devices

Operation of any radio transmitting equipment, including wireless devices, may interfere with the functionality of

inadequately protected medical devices. Consult a physician or the manufacturer of the medical device to determine if they are adequately shielded from external RF energy or if you have any questions. Switch off your device in health care facilities when any regulations posted in these areas instruct you to do so. Hospitals or health care facilities may be using equipment that could be sensitive to external RF energy.

Implanted medical devices

Manufacturers of medical devices recommend that a minimum separation of 15.3 centimeters (6 inches) should be maintained between a wireless device and an implanted medical device, such as a pacemaker or implanted cardiovascular defibrillator, to avoid potential interference with the medical device. Persons who have such devices should:

- Always keep the wireless device more than 15.3 centimeters (6 inches) from the medical device when the wireless device is turned on.

- Hold the wireless device to the ear opposite the medical device to minimize the potential for interference.

Hearing aids

Some digital wireless devices may interfere with some hearing aids. If interference occurs, consult your service provider.

Warning: For hearing aid compatibility, you must turn off the Bluetooth connectivity.

Your mobile device model complies with FCC rules governing hearing aid compatibility. These rules require an M3 microphone or higher value. The M-value, shown on the device box, refers to lower radio frequency (RF) emissions. A higher M-value generally indicates that a device model has a lower RF emissions level, which may improve the likelihood that the device will operate with certain hearing aids. Some hearing aids are more immune than others to interference. Please consult your hearing health professional to determine the M-rating of your hearing aid and whether your hearing aid will work with this device. More information on accessibility can be found at www.nokiaaccessibility.com.

This device includes a setting for direct connection to telecoilequipped hearing aids. When both the telecoil hearing aid (T switch) and the phone telecoil are activated, using the device with the aided ear will provide a direct connection for audio through your hearing aid. The quality of sound depends on the type of hearing aid used. You should test the device with the telecoil setting activated to determine whether your audio performance improves. Using the telecoil hearing-aid setting consumes additional battery power.

Vehicles

RF signals may affect improperly installed or inadequately shielded electronic systems in motor vehicles such as electronic fuel injection systems, electronic antiskid (antilock) braking systems, electronic speed control systems, and air bag systems. For more information, check with the manufacturer, or its representative, of your vehicle or any equipment that has been added.

Only qualified personnel should service the device or install the device in a vehicle. Faulty installation or service may be dangerous and may invalidate any warranty that may apply to the device. Check regularly that all wireless device equipment in your vehicle is mounted and operating properly. Do not store or carry flammable liquids, gases, or explosive materials in the same compartment as the device, its parts, or accessories. For vehicles equipped with an air bag, remember that air bags inflate with great force. Do not place objects, including installed or portable wireless equipment in the area over the air bag or in the air bag deployment area. If in-vehicle wireless equipment is improperly installed and the air bag inflates, serious injury could result.

Using your device while flying in aircraft is prohibited. Switch off your device before boarding an aircraft. The use of wireless teledevices in an aircraft may be dangerous to the operation of the aircraft, disrupt the wireless telephone network, and may be illegal.

Potentially explosive environments

Switch off your device when in any area with a potentially explosive atmosphere, and obey all signs and instructions. Potentially explosive atmospheres include areas where you would normally be advised to turn off your vehicle engine. Sparks in such areas could cause an explosion or fire resulting in bodily injury or even death. Switch off the device at refueling points such as near gas pumps at service stations. Observe restrictions on the use of radio equipment in fuel depots, storage, and distribution areas; chemical plants; or where blasting operations are in progress. Areas with a potentially explosive atmosphere are often, but not always, clearly marked. Emergency calls

Important: This device operates using radio signals, wireless networks, landline networks, and user-programmed functions. Connections in all conditions cannot be guaranteed. You should never rely solely on any wireless device for essential communications like medical emergencies.

To make an emergency call:

- If the device is not on, turn it on. Check for adequate signal strength. Depending on your device, you may also need to complete the following:
- Remove certain call restrictions you have activated in your device.
- Press the end key as many times as needed to clear the display and ready the device for calls.
- Enter the official emergency number for your present location. Emergency numbers vary by location.
- 5. Press the call key.

When making an emergency call, give all the necessary information as accurately as possible. Your wireless device may be the only means of communication at the scene of an accident. Do not end the call until given permission to do so.

Certification information (SAR)

This mobile device meets guidelines for exposure to radio waves. Your mobile device is a radio transmitter and receiver. It is designed not to exceed the limits for exposure to radio waves recommended by international guidelines. These guidelines were developed by the independent scientific organization ICNIRP and include safety margins designed to assure the protection of all persons, regardless of age and health.

The exposure guidelines for mobile devices employ a unit of measurement known as the Specific Absorption Rate or SAR. The SAR limit stated in the ICNIRP guidelines is 2.0 watts/kilogram (W/kg) averaged over 10 grams of tissue. Tests for SAR are conducted using standard operating positions with the device transmitting at its highest certified power level in all tested frequency bands. The actual SAR level of an operating device can be below the maximum value because the device is designed to use only the power required to reach the network. That amount changes depending on a number of factors such as how close you are to a network base station. The highest SAR value under the ICNIRP guidelines for use of the device at the ear is 0.73 W/kg.

Use of device accessories and enhancements may result in different SAR values. SAR values may vary depending on national reporting and testing requirements and the network band.

Additional SAR information may be provided under product information at www.nokia.com.

Your mobile device is also designed to meet the requirements for exposure to radio waves established by the Federal Communications Commission (USA) and Industry Canada. These requirements set a SAR limit of 1.6 W/kg averaged over one gram of tissue. The highest SAR value reported under this standard during product certification for use at the ear is 1.08 W/kg and when properly worn on the body is 0.49W/kg.
